

Daily Journal, Sunday June 25, 2017

The 144th Annual Convention of the Oregon State Grange was opened in the sixth degree at 9am in due form by State Master Susan Noah. The meeting was lowered to the fourth degree and we received a warm welcome to the Florence Events Center from the Worthy Master.

The Credentials Committee provided the report of day one registration as of Saturday June 24th, 2017. 17 state officers, 3 state deputies, 13 state directors, 6 youth officers / delegates, 8 youth officers / non-delegates, 14 junior officers, 88 subordinate delegates, 11 Pomona delegates, 47 members, and 2 visitors/guests, for a total of 176 attendees representing 52 Subordinate Granges, 10 Pomonas.

Celia Luttrell, Oregon State Grange Overseer, was Master pro tem for the remainder of Sunday's session. Susan Noah read a very thoughtful and impactful State Master's Annual Address. Committee report is adopted, resolution is adopted as amended.

Financial Affairs #3, Banking Institutions & Government Structures and Expenses. Financial Affairs committee report is favorable as amended. Rewrite to strike the second bullet and the sixth bullet. Also replace in the fourth bullet "Oregon State Grange seeks" with "State of Oregon partners with counties". Committee report is adopted, resolution is adopted as amended.

By-Laws #3, Election Board for Preferential Election. By-Laws committee report is favorable as amended. Rewrite to strike "and/or" on line 9, insert "and/or past state officers" after the word ballots on line 11. By a 2/3 vote the committee report is adopted, resolution is adopted as amended.

By-Laws #4, Nomination Deadlines for State Officers. By-Laws committee report is favorable as amended. Rewrite to insert in the second resolved after the word filed "by mail or electronic means" and changes the date "January 25" to "February 1." Suzy Ramm moved to substitute the resolution for the committee report. The motion passed by standing vote with 33 in favor, 29 opposed. Orrin Schnetzky moved to adopt the resolution. By common consent we inserted "of odd years" after December to ensure no confusion. Jim Dumolt moved to amend line 16 to insert "by mail or electronic means" after the word filed. Legislative #11, Regional & County Government, Appointed & Elected Officials. Legislative committee report is favorable as amended. Amendment to bullet 1 on line 6 replaces "LCDC's Goal 5, or any similar act," with "any acts". Amendment to bullet 5 on line 24 strikes "to those authorized in SB100". Jeff Dehne moved to postpone indefinitely. It was seconded, discussed, and failed. Committee report is adopted, the resolution is adopted as amended.

Education #5, Schools. Education committee is favorable as amended. Rewrite with amendments to the second bullet striking lines 10-12 after the first sentence, and the third bullet replace "suspension" with "alternatives to suspensions" and striking the remainder of the sentence after the word buildings on line 16. Lyle moved to strike the fourth bullet of the rewrite regarding student busing. The amendment was seconded and carried. Jim Dumolt moved to replace on line 6 "removing" with "replacing". Amendment was seconded and carried. Ed Luttrell moved to amend line 10 by replacing "alternative to suspensions" with "strong and appropriate discipline". Amendment was seconded and discussed. Carl McGlothlin added

"after thorough investigation" to the end of the word discipline. The amendment was seconded and discussed and carried. Division of the house called for a standing vote which found 29 in favor and 20 opposed to the prior vote. The amendment, as amended, was then voted upon and carried. Jesse O'Dell moved to amend the first bullet by replacing the "and" before pop with a comma, inserting "and coffees" after pop, and striking "vending machines". The amendment was seconded and carried. Lexie moved to amend by inserting after Oregon Public Schools on line 7 "during school hours". The amendment was seconded and failed. Peggy Jillson moved to amend the first bullet to state "The OSG supports higher nutritional foods and drinks in Oregon Public Schools." The amendment was seconded and carried. The committee report is adopted as amended, the resolution is adopted as amended.

Good of the Order #6, Translating Brochures. Good of the Order committee report is favorable as amended. Rewrite to state "That the Oregon State Grange shall at the request of any Oregon Subordinate/Community or Pomona Grange produce foreign language recruitment/membership application brochures as budget and skills allow." And "That the Oregon State Grange Master shall report annually at the Oregon State Grange Convention on the requests made and action taken on foreign language recruitment/membership applications brochures." Sarah Kingsborough moved to amend by inserting the word "electronically" after the word brochures in the first resolved, and strike the entire second resolved. The amendment was seconded and carried. By a standing vote with 29 in favor and 19 opposed, the committee report is adopted as amended, the resolution is adopted as amended.

Utilities #2, Energy Sources and Energy Conservation. Utilities committee report is favorable as amended. Rewrite to strike the third and seventh bullets, line 10 in bullet 2 replace "Ogden Martin" with "Covanta Marion, Inc", bullet 4 line 17 replace "REAs" with "co-ops", bullet 5 strike the sentence starting on line 23 "we urge this nation" and line 26 strike "at the earliest possible time". Also in bullet 9 replace the words "the NW Natural Gas or the" with "any". Committee report is adopted, the resolution is adopted as amended.

Legislative #4, Crime, Victims of Crime, Criminal Sentences, and Parole. Legislative committee report is favorable as amended. Rewrite amends the following changes – bullet 4 changed to read "The Oregon State Grange supports Child Predator laws." In the 7th bullet replace "adoption" with "continuation". In bullet 8 replace "shall encourage the Oregon State Legislators to write and pass a law" with "supports laws", bullet 8 replace "that person" with "the person", change bullet 9 to read "We continue to support Oregon stalking laws", change bullet 10 to state, "We support stricter punishment for kidnapping." Change bullet 11 to state "The Oregon Stat Grange supports holding minor children accountable for their criminal acts.", and on bullet 12 replace "finer" with "fine". The committee report is adopted, the resolution is adopted as amended.

Education #6, Subjects Taught in Schools. Education committee is favorable as amended. Rewrite amends for the 1st bullet inserts "students have the right for" before voluntary. In bullet 2 change "oppose" to "encourage" and replace "cuts to" with "for". Change bullet 3 to read, "The Oregon State Grange strongly supports Vocational Agricultural programs, and we oppose any reduction of agricultural science and technology programs in Oregon high schools. In the 4th bullet insert "state and" before country, and strike the second sentence. Change the 5th bullet to read "We encourage hunter safety to be taught in the school system." Mike Gaber moved to insert "legal" before the word immigrants on line 19 or section 6 of the rewrite. Amendment seconded and carried. Carl McGlothlin moved to insert "by

ODFW certified instructors" at the end of the statement on the rewritten line 18, section 5 regarding hunter safety. The amendment was seconded and carried. Peggy Jillson moved to amend to insert "who are not fluent in English" after immigrants in the 6th bullet. Amendment was seconded and carried. Sarah Kingsborough moved to strike the 6th bullet related to special classes for immigrants. The amendment was seconded and carried. Sandi Ludi moved to delete the 5th bullet regarding hunter safety. The amendment was seconded and discussed. By a standing vote 29 in favor and 19 opposed the amendment was carried. Lyle Utt moved to amend the last bullet, line 23 to insert after Driver Education "at an appropriate funding level". Amendment was seconded and carried. Final vote – the committee report is adopted as amended, the resolution is adopted as amended.

Education #7, US Flag, Anthem, and Pledge of Allegiance. Education committee report is favorable as amended. Amendment replaces "become" with "maintain as", plus adds after the word proceedings, "and infuse the meaning of this pledge when appropriate". Committee report is adopted, resolution is adopted as amended.

Utilities #4, Oregon State Grange Energy Policy. Utilities committee report is favorable as a new resolution. Dan Gregg moved to delete the 2nd bullet point. The amendment was seconded and failed. The committee report is adopted, the resolution is adopted.

Insurance 1 Insurance Coverage and Settlements. Insurance committee report is favorable as amended. Amendment in the third bullet, strike statement 2 and 3. Amendment also strikes the fifth bullet. Committee report is adopted, the resolution is adopted as amended.

Virtual Attendance section of the Master's Good of the Order Address. Good of the Order committee report is favorable. The committee report is adopted, this section is adopted.

Resolution of Thanks was read and adopted.

Roger Wilson moved to permit the Executive Committee to approve Thursday's journal. Motion seconded and carried.

Sarah Kingsborough moved to allow new policies set in this convention of the Oregon State Grange to be shared publicly with the exception of Good of the Order and By-Laws. Motion seconded and carried.

The credentials report as of Wednesday June 27th. 17 state officers, 3 state deputies, 13 state directors, 7 youth officers / delegates, 8 youth officers / non-delegates, 14 junior officers, 1 junior member, 103 Subordinate delegates, 13 Pomona delegates, 101 members, 10 visitors for a total of 257 total attendees from 63 Subordinate Granges and 11 Pomona Granges.

The 144th O.S. Grange Convention closed at 6:00 PM in the Fourth Degree by Master Susan Noah.

Master's Annual Address

Susan M Noah State Master

Introduction

Having our annual convention in Florence is another first for us. While we have met in Lane County nine times starting in 1894, all those conventions have been within the Eugene area. We are blessed to be able to move about the State of Oregon, holding our conventions in larger metropolitan areas and smaller towns. I hope that each and every person here will take the time to visit Florence stores and restaurants and let them know you are here for the Oregon State Grange convention.

This year our delegates will be considering some very important matters and the decisions we reach here can have a far reaching effect upon the future of our State Grange and possibly upon the future of our state. I am confident that our members will take the time to deliberate and discuss fully each of the resolutions before us and come up with good and well-reasoned answers. Being diligent in our labors will allow us to take great pride in the results.

Legislative

This legislative session has been focused on trying to close the budget gap in any manner possible. One of the possible new revenue streams legislators are pursuing may have an impact on our organization. That is SB 181. This bill would require that certain recognized charitable organizations would be required to file an information return with the county assessor before April 1st of each year in order to keep their property tax exemption. While the specific target of this bill is organizations that are considered exempt from property taxes under ORS 307.130, and the Grange receives our exempt status under a different section of the Oregon Revised Statues, nevertheless there could still be confusion on the part of the county assessor's office leading to problems.

Our new Lobbyist, Craig Loughridge, has led the fight against this bill. Many of our members from all around the state have sent letters and emails or have testified in person as to the possible damage this could do to not only our organization, but to other non-profits as well. As a volunteer based community organization, Granges throughout the state have been there to benefit the health and wellbeing of their communities. We have sponsored countless scholarships and youth activities; we have collected food and donated clothing; we have helped veterans and seniors. We have opened our halls to other community groups and individuals to serve as the community gathering place. What we do matters, not just to us, but to the communities we support.

As of this date, SB 181 was still on the table, although apparently there are possible amendments that would remove some of the uncertainty in regards to the Grange. If one of those amendments were to be adopted the bill would narrow the subject non-profits to those who have been in existence for less than five years. I know the State of Oregon is under great pressure to balance the budget, but I do not feel that this is either an effective or profitable way to do so. Community based organizations such as the Grange provide a value that is difficult to measure in dollars and even harder to replace.

Recently the Grange has supported the idea of using lottery dollars to increase funding for Veterans in Oregon. In fact last fall Oregon voters confirmed by a large margin that they were committed to helping our Veterans through this funding effort. Unfortunately, although this passed, when the Governor submitted her budget, she zeroed the amount that Veterans would receive through the State budget, believing that the lottery dollars would replace this budget line item. I'm sure this was not what voters had in mind. Again this is a place where the Grange can make our voice heard. Let your representatives know of our position. We support our veterans.

The Grange is not, nor ever has been, involved in partisan politics. But we can and should take an active interest in the issues facing us as citizens. We can take great pride in the fact that as brothers and sisters we debate issues and arrive at decisions through the use of civil discourse. We do not disparage one another for different beliefs; we talk to each other and try to understand the other's viewpoint. We do not always agree, but at the end of the day we are still a part of the Grange family. If only we could expect the same from our elected officials.

Patriotism

It has been said that America is a giant melting pot, and if we look around our own State we see the truth in that. We cannot fall into the trap of condemning those who differ from usthose whose political viewpoint varies from ours, those of a different religion, or those who do not share the same life goals. Every day we are seeing news stories that tell an increasingly bleak picture of life in these United States, and we are bombarded with social media stories that do no better.

In the Grange we know better, in the Grange we *are* better. If we are to truly show our patriotism, or in other words our love for our county we should be foremost in promoting the principles of the Grange. We teach respect for county and for our county's flag. We lead by example, and we honor each other by doing so.

Agriculture

When asked to describe Oregon agriculture, the then Director of the Oregon Department of Agriculture, Katy Coba, said: "Incredibly diverse, clean, green, environmentally friendly, innovative and high quality." She went on to say that Oregon produces a wider variety of agriculture and food items than almost any other state. Oregon ranks number one in volume of exported agricultural products and our total of processed food exports grew 80% between 2009 and 2013.

Due to Oregon's quality food and agricultural products our agricultural community has hosted buyers from China, South Korea, Japan, Canada, the European Union and Russia, among others. One of the newer international trade events to start up in Oregon is Feast Portland. This four day trade show has become one of the premier food events in the county. This is just one event that is putting Oregon on the national stage.

But Oregon agriculture is much more than the food products we export. The *Growing Oregon* magazine had a small article on Growing in Harmony. Oregon is also a state that understands agricultural coexistence, and it all starts with two farmers talking, and continuing to talk to work out their differences. Small organic farmers can and do survive next to larger commercial operations as long as those involved communicate. Both sides receive an

education in "the other type of farming." In a state that is so agriculturally diverse, there is a good chance for conflict. In the Willamette Valley, high value broadleaf crops such as wine grapes and blueberries grow adjacent to grass seed and grain crops. Communication between the farms is necessary to a fruitful coexistence.

Water

Although this year suggests that water is plentiful and available to all, we know that lately it has been more of anomaly than the norm. Thirty five members of a scientific team at Oregon State University just finished a six-year modeling study called Willamette Water 2100. The verdict was that over the next 90 years with the population growth predicted and a warming climate there will be a water shortage within the Willamette Valley. Hopefully the findings of this six- year study will be to mitigate some of these scarcities. They started with a 'business as usual' scenario to give a baseline prediction of when and where water shortages would occur. From there they started with "what if" questions. Like what if more farmers wanted to use irrigation, or what if incentives were given to encourage water conservation? Combining human and natural dynamics is rare in a model, but through software designed at Oregon State they were able to determine that the future patterns of water scarcity depend more on the people side, than a warming climate. Population growth, urban expansion, farming practices and conservation measures will have an impact on where and when it will happen as well as the how big of an impact it will have. Tools such as water laws, land use practices, utilities management and environmental regulations will be used to allocate what water there is.

In response to droughts in 2014 and 2015 a dry farming project was set up at the Oak Creek Center for Urban Horticulture at the edge of OSU's Corvallis Campus. Well known varieties of plants, such as melons and tomatoes, have been planted side by side with crops being irrigated. So far dry farming is showing promise, as taste testing is showing that dry farmed crops have superior flavor. But it is too early to tell if this type of farming would be economically viable as some of the vegetables produced smaller fruit, and non-irrigated crops are planted further apart to reduce competition for available moisture. But considering that irrigation consumes as much as 70% of the world's freshwater, dryland farming may be a sustainable alternative. The trials are continuing.

Changes in technology and knowledge have given us the ability to predict water scarcity and hopefully to prolong its abundance, but that does not absolve us from our duties to stay informed. We should as Grange members and as individuals take an interest in laws and regulations that restrict or portion water, as well as those that change the use. For those of us who do not live on a farm, and whose water comes from a utility company rather than a well, it is easy to ignore the plight of the farmer who may be dependent on reservoir water for irrigation. A reservoir that may have been drained by others also needing water, or not filled to capacity some years due to low rainfall and snowpack. While I believe that land use laws play an important role in our State, remember that laws that restrict the farmer will have an effect on the food we eat, and what we pay for it.

Education

We all know that education in Oregon has challenges. Whether funding shortages, student drop-out rate, or increased tuition, a lot is going on with our education system. My question is how can our members help? Many volunteer opportunities exist at all levels of education. From being a mentor in a middle school to handing out forms at high school registration, or

taking tickets at events, volunteers can make a difference. Interested in getting out of the school room? How about helping with a field trip? Have high level skills in math, science or foreign language? How about tutoring? Love to read and want to instill that in others, help in the library or work in the SMART program (Start Making a Reader Today). Have a GWA group that loves to sew? Make costumes for the local high school drama department. In today's schools there are simply far more jobs and responsibilities than there people to do them. By helping with special events and routine tasks, volunteers allow teachers and staff to focus more on helping children to learn and grow. The school can accomplish more and offer children and families more services with the help of volunteers.

Even if you only have an extra hour or two a week, contact your local school to discuss your interests and what volunteer opportunities are available.

One other way that I know Granges are making a difference is with scholarships offered. I would be very interested to know just how much money is made available each year to students through scholarships offered by our Subordinate, Pomona and the State Grange.

The other way that all of us can be of service to our schools is simply to pay attention to what is going on. No matter what age you are, whether you have children in schools or not, education of today's children will have an effect on all of us. Attend school board meetings and be informed about school policies. If your Grange is lucky enough to have a +1 Junior allow them time to share school stories. Being educated ourselves is the best help we can give our schools.

Conclusion

As I conclude this address I realize that I have only touched on a few of the many matters that are important to our daily lives. I believe that this is a time when organizations such as ours are needed more than ever. Allen Wheeler, Past Master of the Oregon State Grange, said "we can be more effective as we increase our numerical strength. We can increase our numerical strength as a result of being more effective." Seemingly this is the age old question of "which came first?" We have to work each of these together in order to grow and become more effective. Our members must be dedicated to providing service to their communities, and at the same time they must make known to those outside our gates the work that is being done. Too often I see Granges who are doing good work, but do not take the time to make non-members aware of the work or of the possibility of even greater accomplishments through their participation in the Grange. We have the tools; they are tried and true. For nearly 150 years the Grange has been a force for agriculture, service and family. As we finish the first 150 and start on the next, I leave you with our motto: *In essentials, unity; in non-essentials, liberty and in all things charity.* If we live up to this motto, we will increase our numbers and our standing. The workings of your State Grange should not be a mystery to our members, nor should anyone feel that they cannot ask questions or offer suggestions. We are all in this together, and it is by working together that we will improve our fraternity. Remember this address is internal and should be for our members only.

Membership & GrangeUp '17

How are you feeling about our chance to show a growth in membership? I feel pretty good about it! As you all know our state took on a membership campaign this year that has been both ambitious and rewarding. The State Officers, Committee Directors and their District Chairs delivered 169 boxes of materials and 169 banners to each and every Grange in the State of Oregon! Just the fact of getting this material to each Grange was an undertaking and all involved deserve my thanks and appreciation for a job very well done! These members are committed to staying in contact with their selected Granges for the rest of the year -- to offer encouragement, to answer questions and to celebrate with them.

The first quarter is always hard to show growth due to drops for non-payment of dues, but this year we came very close. In a few cases the quarter ended before Granges had been visited or even knew about the program. So I have high hopes for the second quarter and beyond.

As with any endeavor someone always crosses the finish line first and as the boxes were being delivered I could see that one group was working hard to be that district. So please give a round of applause to our leaders from District #3! As the final box was delivered in their district I believe I received an email from two or three members asking if they were indeed the first district to finish. It is that spirit that will ensure that we do have a net gain at the end of 2017.

The GrangeUp campaign is only the start. In my Healthy Grange workshops this year we started with membership because I see this as one of the major building blocks of our order. Without a group of committed members who work together, we have only a shell of a building and lessons that no one hears. Questions that I feel are strong indicators of a healthy Grange include, "Are there younger members who will carry on? Are there mentors? Are families involved? Are new members welcomed and instructed in what the Grange is?" Can your Grange answer yes to these questions?

If our membership is to not only grow in numbers but also grow in strength and impact within the community, we must present the Grange story, and our Granges must be active in the community. The Granges with the largest membership around this state and probably around the nation are those who are active, who are presenting themselves as being a vital part of their community. I cannot stress enough that Granges who are active, busy in their community, and welcoming of members are those who are growing. Granges who have

members who only come to make the quorum, do nothing outside their doors, and who argue among themselves will continue to struggle. Which are you?

Ritualism

Our Grange lessons are the foundation of our order. They used to be the very first building block in a Grange life. Our candidates would witness the first four degrees in order to become full-fledged members. As they enter the hall in the first degree, blindfolded, they are confronted by the Overseer who explains that "the Grange is a great fraternity, and the lessons of its ritual are expressed by the use of symbols drawn from the field, the farm and the farm home." That one sentence explains so much, but the entire first degree goes on to inform us of our choices in life and the impact they have on us and our family and friends.

For years we have neglected our ritual and our lessons. Some are put off by the very term, but in reality ritual is defined as "a solemn ceremony consisting of a series of actions performed according to a prescribed order." The lessons gained from our degrees are a foundation of the order and what we stand for. I have always said that if our ritual is not being used, it is because we have not done our best to explain it or help our new members understand it. But before we can expect new members to embrace it, we must embrace and understand it ourselves.

The first and easiest step to this is to open and close meetings in full form, using either the traditional or alternative manual. Our opening and closing ceremonies serve as an official start and end to the meeting and can be done even while seated around a table. Of course I would rather see the Grange set up the hall and do the floorwork, but even the minimal approach helps to educate our members.

I also encourage each Grange to take some time every month and read through the degree work. There you will find many bits of wisdom that continue to contribute to our lives. One of these, my favorite passage, is said by the Overseer in the first degree, "Education adds the greatest charm to a woman; it is a companion of which no misfortune can deprive her, a friend no enemy can alienate, an ornament in prosperity and a refuge in adversity." If I were trying to persuade a young woman to further her education, I could not find more eloquent words to do so.

Many say that our ceremonies and rituals are what set us apart from other groups, like the Kiwanis or the Rotary, but I believe it is the lessons contained in those rituals, the lessons that make up our foundation that we build upon as members of the Grange. If we truly embrace these lessons, I guarantee the Grange will grow and thrive.

Virtual Attendance

At our last annual convention we adopted several resolutions in response to the ruling made by our National Master regarding virtual attendance. These resolutions were sent on to the National Grange for consideration by that delegate body. Other states sent their resolutions. As a result the National Grange adopted a policy that allows State Granges to set their own parameters. The Oregon State Grange Executive Committee has adopted rules for use by Subordinate/ Community Granges in regard to virtual attendance.

In short this policy allows each Grange to decide if they want to allow virtual participation. Per the resolution adopted here last year, a physical quorum of seven members must be

maintained, although the Executive Committee decided to allow voting by members not physically present as long as our guidelines are met. The policy your Executive Committee adopted will be distributed at this convention and will be mailed to each Grange when we return to the office.

As stated in the policy, virtual attendance should only be used to enhance your meetings and should in no way be considered a replacement for attendance and participation at your Grange meetings.

Finances

As you can see from the budget we have based our calculations for 2018 on 4,900 members. This will mean an almost 400 member gain from where we were at the end of quarter one. But in quarter one, we took in 192 members, so I know we can do it. As you know the dues receipts are the bulk of our income. Our investments add to it, and we receive some outside help through our supportive membership with GIA. That money always goes into the Leadership/Membership fund as set up in our by-laws. The 2018 budget, if adopted, will once again be withdrawing more money from that fund than is going into it. GIA has made the decision to cut the amount they distribute to the Western States by \$100,000 bringing our amount down to \$17,900 from \$21,480 last year. Still I would be the first to say that our money needs to work for us, and the budget committee and the Executive Committee both agree that this is a good use of those funds. As I have heard others say, the Grange may need an emergency fund, but we do not need a retirement fund. We need to continue to use our funds in an efficient way to promote and grow the Grange.

I am pleased to announce that the Executive Committee has made the decision to extend the Sign program another year. This program has been made possible from the money left to us from Sherwood Grange in memory of Muzzy Mandel. This gift of \$30,000 was made available to the State Grange to be used for either grants or loans to Subordinate Granges. Last year the Executive Committee decided to make some of this money available to Subordinate Granges to improve their hall signage in time for our 150th anniversary. The program will reimburse any Grange for one half the cost of a sign up to a cap of \$350 (\$700 sign cost), provided that the conditions of the program are met. So far 17 Granges have made use of this program for a total expenditure of \$4,942.51.

Our grant program is also still going strong. To date, over the three years of the program, we have made 36 grants to 36 different Subordinate Granges for a total of \$141,149.03. I believe that this is one of the best uses of our Reverted Grange funds. While other states may be using the money for budget purposes, we are reinvesting in our Subordinate Granges. From the pictures I have seen of these grant projects, this has been a very worthwhile investment.

The State Grange has tried over the last year to take part in events that bring credit and awareness to the organization. Our booths at Ag Fest and the FFA Convention, our luncheon at the State Capitol and our Legislative Day at the Capitol all help to raise the awareness of the Grange as does our hosting of the Log Cabin during the State Fair. Your Ag Director, Jay Sexton with the aid of his committee, has taken part in several other events including the Oregon State University Small Farms Conference and the Women in Sustainable Agriculture conference in Portland. All of these public relation events serve to introduce our organization to an audience who could be natural members. So while the State Grange does not ask potential members to join, we do help with member recruitment.

Lobbyist

As you know Brother Jim Welsh made the decision to retire from his lobbying career in 2015. Jim had represented the Oregon State Grange for many years and his retirement certainly left a void in our legislative efforts. In 2016 during the short session of the State Legislature Brother Ed Luttrell stepped up to represent the Oregon State Grange. With a legislature focused mainly on passing a budget Ed took the time to report weekly on topics that were of interest to our membership, and through his efforts we retained our legislative connection.

This year the State Grange has been fortunate to secure a new lobbyist. Brother Craig Loughridge, seven year member of Clarkes Grange, has taken on the duties and is doing a tremendous job. Already the Grange has a higher profile through his efforts at combating SB 181, a bill that would require our Community Granges to file a property tax exemption every year. Brother Loughridge has continued on with the reporting that Brother Luttrell started and has set up an email list to distribute his weekly update called *The Capitol Granger*.

Roster

I come to you with a problem that only our Subordinate and Pomona Granges can solve. We must start getting timely information for the Roster if we want it to continue. In a time where we want our limited resources to be put to the best use, I need the cooperation of all of our Granges to assemble this resource. I use this tool a great deal, so personally I do not want to see the Roster go away, but I also have to weigh the time and money spent in gathering information. As of the December 1st deadline we had received reports from fewer than 35% of the Granges, leaving our office the option of putting off the finished product or calling all the Granges who were late. Doing some of each left us with a late and somewhat lacking product.

So I want to propose some suggestions for your consideration. Granges probably miss the December 1 deadline because Masters, especially newly elected Masters, have not yet appointed committees. Perhaps we should consider cutting down on the information we include; keep the current officers, the membership chair, and the rental chair and leave out other committee chairs. Or perhaps we should involve the Deputies or Pomonas in gathering this information, although the Pomonas are often not timely themselves. With only three of us in the office, and with the office hours ending before many of our members are home for the evening, we have a problem that is only solvable by participation of all parties. I ask our Grange Programs and Activities committee at this convention to discuss this problem to see what reforms, if any, could or should be made. I am not opposed to the current format, but clearly this needs some discussion among our delegates, in order to ensure a useful tool.

Pomona Granges

Last year I remarked that I was still looking for members to be on a task force to evaluate and rebuild our Pomona Granges. I did gain a few volunteers for this task force, but still not representation from each District. Now, in order to move forward and have a work product before our 2018 convention, I have decided to appoint the current Pomona Masters as well as the members who have previously responded to my request. I plan on setting a first meeting sometime in late September to start the discussion. I feel that everything is on the table, no ideas will be discarded, and everyone will have a chance to express their thoughts.

During one of the Healthy Grange workshops, a member suggested that this also may be the time to look at redrawing our six districts. Since the inception of those districts, many changes have taken place with some Granges consolidating and others going dormant. Large areas of our state are now without Granges, and while all of us would love for this to be different, we must face the reality of the situation.

I will repeat what I reported in 2016, we are looking to redevelop the Pomona Grange and bring it back to an entity that benefits and supports our Subordinate Granges and members. I pledge that by 2018 we will have a plan for this renewal. I cannot guarantee that what will be presented will make all of our problems go away, but I can say that this year we will work together to provide our delegates the necessary information to make a decision for our path forward. Volunteers are still welcome.

150th Anniversary

Are you all ready to celebrate? We can and should be so proud of this great organization. This is the perfect time to show that pride to our friends and neighbors. The State Grange is planning our own celebration on December 4th. My original plan was to hold the party at our State Capitol, but the Legislature will not be in session and decorating for the holidays will be in full swing, so the location will likely change. Wherever we end up, each Grange will receive an invitation to our party.

In honor of the 150th anniversary, Sister Marilyn Reiher has taken the time to design and implement a traveling display telling the Oregon Grange story. This display is currently making the rounds of libraries in Oregon and has been very well received. By the end of the year it will have been displayed at 16 libraries across the state, and two are scheduled for next year. One of the more exciting stops though will come next year when it will be at the Multnomah Central Library. With 12 different display cases to fill and a reception in our honor, this is a major undertaking, but will offer many people a look at our Grange and our history.

National Grange Convention

This November the Western States will host the 151st National Grange Convention in Spokane, Washington. Many of you have said you will be attending, and I am looking forward to having a large contingent of our members. I encourage anyone who is thinking of attending to register via the National Grange website and book your room early.

Oregon will be hosting the hospitality room on Wednesday of the convention and volunteers are always welcome. Sister Connie Suing will be in charge of the room. In addition Sister Louise Holst has offered to help with the garments for the 7th degree, and I know she would welcome help as well.

The Western Region has chosen an animal husbandry theme for our community service project at the convention, and with that we are looking for donations for pet shelters. So make "Bailey" happy. Bring something with you to donate to a shelter. If you are not planning on attending but would like to donate something just get it to me. Mark and I will be driving this year, so there should be plenty of room for extras.

In 1988, Idaho and Oregon members traveled together to the Redding Convention in a chartered bus. They had such a great time that they decided to continue getting together annually in one state or the other for a "Hands across the Border" luncheon. The strength of

the friendships they made makes me think that we should consider a bus to the Spokane Convention. If this is something you would be interested in, let one of our Executive Committee members know. Friday night of the National Convention is the Evening of Excellence when our talent winner will perform. Our own State Grange officers will exemplify the 6th Degree on Saturday morning and the 7th Degree will be exemplified on Saturday November 11th at 1:00 p.m. The Celebration Banquet will be held that night. Anyone attending should plan on a couple of nights to see the highlights!

In Memoriam

It is always fitting that we set aside time at our annual convention to remember and honor our members who have passed on. Monday morning our Chaplain will pay tribute to these members and we will all continue on as we have done through the ages, but our memories of our brothers and sisters will linger on and the real tribute will be when we continue their good works and good will. This year we lost a very close personal friend and mentor to many of us, Brother Joe Canaday. No matter what he was called upon to do, he always took up the challenge and completed the task to the best of his ability. So to this Granger and friend I say, "Well done good and faithful servant."

Conclusion

100 years ago this month the Oregon State Grange was meeting in Astoria for our 44th annual convention. The United States had just entered into the First World War and the Master at that time, Brother C.E. Spence, in his annual report related that now more than ever the Grange should guard the interests of the farmer. He also repeated the words of the Nebraska State Grange Master who said: "There has never been a time since the Grange was organized when it was more needed than just at present." Move forward 100 years and know that the Grange is needed now more than ever. Our organization stands out as one where you may meet with your neighbors and discuss with them the problems facing our communities and nation.

As members of this fraternity we should be able to meet and discuss the problems of the state and nation in a fraternal spirit with a strong desire to learn from each other and exchange thoughts and ideas. We may have differences of opinion, but that is all right. Our open and through discussions will bring out the best and discard the rest. So as we start our 144th annual convention I have faith that the delegates and members assembled here will guide our Grange to make good decisions for us, and our State and Nation.

Agriculture Committee Report

2017 has been my third year with the Agriculture Committee. We continued traditional events, hit the road for GrangeUp Hall visits, and played an active role in the Oregon State Grange.

In Late November of 2016 we had the rare opportunity to have a table at the Women in Sustainable Agriculture Conference in Portland. This was the 5th occurrence of this conference, which is held every few years, and the first time it has been on the West Coast. Hundreds of women active in agriculture visited with us at our booth.

This year's Oregon Ag Fest in late April in Salem we had over 50 Granger volunteer slots filled. This helped reduce the exhaustion of the core team of six volunteers, and in 2018 we hope to get more people involved. Approximately 20,000 people attend this family oriented experience, and Vernon and Paula Herrick, of the Ag Committee, prepare over 5000 seedlings for the Grange to hand out to interested children and adults. Teufel Products Company donates organic potting soil we use, arranged by Granger John Knox.

The Ag Committee had a table at the Oregon FFA conference in Redmond. We interacted with hundreds of attendees, handing out Grange information and hundreds of the blue Grange wrist bands while we promoted the Grange. The Oregon Grange again sponsored the FFA Prepared Public Speaking Contest, as we have for over 80 years.

For the second year we had a table at the 17th annual Oregon State University Small Farms Conference. This year Oregon State Grange was a Silver Level Sponsor; with a prime table location and the Grange logo displayed more prominently at the conference. Over 900 attendees, with many young farmers, young families, and perfect future Grange members attend this annual event. District 6 Ag Chair June Colony, District 4 Ag Chair Jessie Jo Guttridge, and I, spent many hours chatting with these small farmers and handing out contact and meeting information for Granges close to the attendees homes.

Our State Convention this year will have two Agriculture Conferences. On Monday Elise Higley from Our Family Farms will speak about their organization, its history, actions, and goals. Our Family Farms advocates for family farms, seed biodiversity, and protections for small farmers especially in specialty crops.

The second Ag Conference on Thursday morning will have Spencer Creek Granger Genie Harden talking on starting a Farmers Market. Genie has organized and managed a Farmers Market at Spencer Creek Grange, near Eugene, for years, and has helped other groups starting their own markets. Public interest in Farmers Markets and in direct contact with growers is a natural opportunity for Granges, bringing people to the hall.

This year's Ag Tour visited Florence's bayside Farmers Market and heard from Steve Wilson who manages this market. He told us about the history and organization of their market. Next we heard about commercial fishing on the Oregon Coast.

The Agriculture Committee looks forward to strengthening our Granges and introducing farmers to The Grange.

Communications Team Report

The Communications Team continues to evolve and change our contributions to the Oregon State Grange. Our team members have contributed significantly to the Oregon State Grange's programs in the last year.

GrangeUp '17

During a discussion of a membership campaign at the Directors' Retreat in October, the name **GrangeUp '17 Engage. Connect. Celebrate.** was created in partnership with the Directors. After the Retreat team members contributed by:

- Designing the logo. Who knew the buttons would be so popular?
- Writing a script for the GrangeUp launch to demonstrate how to present the banner and box to Granges and possibly overcome objections.
- Helping the Membership Committee pack the boxes with papers, pens, and wrist bands.
- Explaining the campaign to members via *Grange Bulletin* articles and later sharing early successes.
- Delivering banners and boxes to Granges in Clackamas, Jackson, Josephine, Linn, Wasco, and Washington Counties.

Website

The good news is that the State Grange website has **not** been hacked in the last year. Software updates are being installed automatically. The Webmaster applies plugin and theme updates as soon as they appear. However, hacking can occur at any time and come from any country so if you see something on our website that seems inappropriate, please notify the Webmaster as soon as possible so that corrective action can be taken.

The same goes for broken links. There are 1500 links on our website – links to forms and documents, links to other websites, and links to email addresses. Often the same link appears on more than one page. We have installed a broken link checker, but it has to be run to identify problems. So if you encounter a broken link, sending the Webmaster an email will get faster results than complaining about it to your fellow members.

Some have asked why our website does not have an SSL (Secure Socket Layer) certificate. Sites with an SSL certificate have URLs that start with "https://" instead of "http://" to indicate that collected data is encrypted. If you are using the Chrome browser, you may notice that Google has begun marking non-SSL sites as "Not Secure."

Our website does not collect personal data, like contact information and credit card numbers. If we did, having an SSL certificate would be essential. A free SSL is available from our hosting company, but it has limitations. We will continue to monitor this, but for the time being we do not need an SSL.

Statistics on which pages are most visited are remarkably consistent with last year. So far this year 26% of those who find our website didn't go farther than the first page. These are the most visited pages:

Thanks to all who have sent items for the event calendar or changes to meeting days or times. Remember when computers first came to rule our world? The phrase we heard was "garbage in, garbage out." It still applies. Having up-to-date information is crucial so that users will have confidence in our website.

Grange Bulletin

Several adjustments were made to the Bulletin, but they are not as visible to the reader as those in previous years. These mostly involved formatting and ways to make the pages more uniform. The Editor is still working on a black vs. gray type problem. It all looks black on the screen, but the type in the printed paper is in some places a shade of gray.

One of the exciting new sections this year was a page in the April/May paper honoring our members who are currently serving in the armed forces. This will be an annual section of the paper.

The upcoming October/November paper will have a special section/list of 150th Anniversary events scheduled for December 1-4, 2017. This is in addition to the list of Granges Celebrating

the Holidays. A flyer was mailed with the 2nd Quarter Report just before convention. Copies of the flyer are available at the registration table. Please let the Editor know what your plans are by September 10th. Let's have parties and events statewide.

Again this year two of the issues contained four-color pages (back, front and middle section). These appeared in the August/September issue with pictures from the state convention and in the February/March issue, which was provided to Granges who asked for copies for Grange Month events. Hopefully the budget allows this to continue. The difference is 7¢ per copy on 24 pages or less than \$250 per issue.

We love suppling extra papers for your special events but remember to request them before the publication date. Otherwise you may have to use back issues. We are unable to continually send extras of every issue to a Grange. There are only so many extras printed, and we want to be able to spread them around Granges.

Each year the goal is to increase the number of stories/notices from different Granges. This year we published stories from 101 Subordinate/Community Granges, which is the same as last year, and four Pomona Granges, down from five last year. Additionally, nine Granges with 1+ Juniors provided stories on their Juniors for the paper, which was up from four the previous year. Next year we hope to have even more Granges represented in the paper. Wouldn't it be nice if every Grange in the state appeared in the Bulletin at least once each year? And please send more stories showing your Juniors, youth and young adults participating in your Grange activities.

One thing that would be helpful to your Editor is if Granges would submit only one subject or event per article. Your newsletters are great but it's hard to convert them into an article. Sometimes the Editor will contact you for more information. Also, if you have a Facebook page that the OSG Bulletin is not following, please let the Editor know. Facebook pages often have a picture(s) that leads to a story.

A special "Thank You" goes to Marilyn Reiher for proofing the paper. The Bulletin would not be a quality paper without her expertise and hard work.

150th Anniversary

One of our team members designed the 150th Anniversary banner that was given to all Granges in the state by the State Grange Executive Committee. The banner was a big hit! Granges are proudly displaying it in a prominent spots in their hall.

Another team member suggested a 150 Years of Grange exhibit for libraries and museums. Unfortunately, no two libraries have even similar display cases. A timeline poster is the center of the display. A copy is on display in the lobby. If the library's display case is larger than the poster, labelled objects (ballot box, seal, gavel, sashes, books, newspapers, etc.) and photos of local Grange halls are added. If they don't have a display case, an artist's easel holds the poster securely on top of a table or low bookcase.

Approximately 70 libraries and museums were contacted by email. The response has been terrific. Moving the exhibit from library to library is a logistical nightmare. Thanks to the Executive Committee, we now have three copies of the timeline poster, which should make this process easier.

The biggest challenge is ahead. The Multnomah County Central Library (previously called Portland Public Library) has scheduled the exhibit for April 28-June 24, 2018. They have 12 display cases. All 12 cases must be filled. While historic photos and newspaper articles can be used, 3-D objects are preferred. If your Grange has photos or objects that you think might be appropriate and are willing to loan, please contact Marilyn at m_reiher@comcast.net. Experienced fair booth designers are also needed to design a case or two. Detailed design plans must be submitted in October.

This exhibit will be excellent advertising for the Grange. The Central Library will host an Opening Reception for it. In addition, the Oregon State Grange can schedule two programs during the exhibit period. They are looking for demonstrations, not lectures.

Conclusion

Several OSG committees have requested assistance from the Communications Team. We have reviewed/proofed letters and articles for the *Grange Bulletin*. We ordered business cards for the members of the Legislative Committee. We are also happy to assist Subordinate/Community and Pomona Granges with all forms of communications.

Team members attended a recent Grange anniversary party that used Grange placemats as part of their decorating scheme. What a great idea! Along the side of the placemat was an application form. That's convenient. But we couldn't help but notice the words above the form. They seemed to bark directions, "Fill out the individual membership application below if you are interested in joining ______ Grange..." How about "We'd really like to have you join us!"

Legislative Committee Report

As the saying goes, "It is always calmest before the storm" and that sums up the current Grange year for your Legislative Committee. We did not have a lot of activity from June to December, but then the legislative session began after the first of the year and things got interesting! For the first few weeks of the session the Oregon State Grange did not have a lobbyist in Salem. Several district chairpersons, notably District 4 Don Kingsborough and District 5 Dean High, followed issues and forwarded information on proposed legislation that could affect the Grange. Brother Dean took note of several bills early in the session that needed to be followed, and he also drafted Brother Phil Van Buren to attend a Klamath regional meeting about the wolf issue. This meeting turned out to be rather contentious, as you might imagine. Dean also referred us to HB 2006, which would disallow mortgage interest deduction for residences other than taxpayer's principal residence, and HB 2771, which would phase out the itemized deduction for property taxes based on income. Both of these bills have not moved from committee since March.

Agriculture Director Jay Sexton communicated with us regarding several bills that would impact farmers and agriculture issues, including HB 3249, which would create an Oregon Agricultural Heritage Fund for the purpose of obtaining grants to assist owners of working land with succession planning or conservation management planning. Based on existing OSG policy we were able to submit written testimony in support of this bill to the House Committee on Agriculture and Natural Resources.

The Legislative Committee returned the favor of Ag Director Jay Sexton's legislative involvement by helping with the Ag Luncheon at the Legislature. This event is held

during each full session of the Legislature and is a big hit with legislators, staff members and visitors! Legislative Committee members Don Kingsborough and Mark Noah helped carve and serve delicious BBQ tri-tip to the appreciative crowd.

SB 181 would require non-profit organizations to file for property tax exemption every year, with stiff penalties for failure to file. It passed almost unnoticed in the Senate, and was on the House Revenue Committee schedule when we heard of it. Many members wrote to their legislators or to the members of that committee, and several testified at the public hearing on May 9. The committee chair interpreted the bill in present form as being aimed at 501c3 organizations, not 501c8 fraternal organizations like the Grange (however, the Grange Foundation is a 501c3). We continue to monitor the bill's progress.

Grange Legislative Day was a success, with attendees from around the state gathering in Room 50 of the State Capitol. A highlight was the introduction of our new Grange Lobbyist Craig Loughridge, who also will be the featured speaker at our Legislative Conference on Thursday morning of the State Grange Convention. Both houses of the legislature were in session at 11am, so members had time to observe the action and then meet again for lunch. We were joined at lunch by Senator Betsy Johnson, a member of Warren Grange in Columbia County (and an affiliate member at Brownsmead in Clatsop Co). Senator Johnson was generous with her time and very informative. SB 181 was discussed extensively at this meeting and after lunch several members, including Jeff Dehne, went directly to the offices of their senator and representative to express concern about the bill.

I'd like to thank the members of the Legislative Committee for their support and participation: District 1 Harold Johnson, District 3 Orrin Schnetzky, District 4 Don Kingsborough, District 5 Dean High. Our District 2 director was unable to continue in the position and Brother Martin McClure recently agreed to accept the appointment in her place. We hope to be able to announce a new District 6 director at this convention.

We lost an important voice with the untimely passing of Brother Scott Colony, our District 6 director. He was actively engaged in political issues in and around Wallowa County. The Grange will miss his influence and support, and Grange members will miss a friend.

Once again the Oregon State Grange has an official lobbyist, but we must all continue to focus on the activities of our state legislature and our federal government. Thomas Jefferson said, "Whenever the people are well informed, they can be trusted with their own government; that whenever things get so far wrong as to attract their notice, they may be relied on to set them to rights." Thus informed voters are part of the checks and balances of our system of government, and Grangers are setting an example of informed involvement. I'm proud to be a Granger!

Budget: The Oregon State Grange 2017 Budget was presented to the Board. The 2017 Budget was compiled by Master Susan Noah, Overseer and bookkeeper Celia Luttrell and Oregon State Treasurer Sarah Kingsborough. The Budget was reviewed line by line and discussed.

Lunch Break: The meeting broke for lunch at 12:02

The meeting was called back to order by the Worthy Master at 12:40 pm.

Budget: The review and discussion of the 2017 Budget continued. Don Sether made a motion to present to the State Session Delegates the 2017 Budget as presented by the budget committee. Roger Wilson seconded the motion. The motion was carried.

Request from Fruitdale Grange #379: A trust fund request for \$12,666.00 was received from Fruitdale Grange #379 for hall improvements and repair of the parking lot. Don Sether made a motion to allow Fruitdale Grange #379 their request for \$12,666.00 for their projects. Malcolm Trupp seconded the motion. The motion was carried.

Request from Boring-Damascus Grange #260: A trust fund request was received for funds to finish the elevator lift and materials. They needed \$8,400.00 to complete this work. Roger Wilson made a motion to approve the \$8400.00 for the lift improvements. Malcolm Trupp seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Audit Recommendations: The Moss Adams Audit Team presented a list of audit recommendations. A discussion and review was held regarding these recommendations. The following will be implemented:

- As part of the review process for the restricted funds schedule the OSG Master should tie out the Net Assets. Beginning of the year balance to the prior year ending balance.
- Manually sign off or initial on the monthly closing packets by the OSG Master to confirm official approval.
- Implement a formal time entry process where the hourly employees enter their time and have the OSG Master approve by physically signing off or initialing on the timesheets.
- Incorporate hardware or software process to develop an offsite data storage routine for recovery and restoration in the event of disasters or other incidents that could interrupt the ongoing conducting of business.
- Manually sign off or initial on the annual fund activity recap by OSG Master prior to the annual meeting convention to confirm official approval.
- The Board should designate someone to review The OSG Master's receipts and match them to the credit card statement prior to payment. This person will be an Executive Board Member.
- The client should consider upgrading to a different general ledger and accounting software, which would maintain fund balances, but be more efficient for financial reporting purposes and would also have technical support.
- The Board should evaluate the Employee Handbook and update as necessary.
- An annual review of the employee job performance be documented and discussed with employee as a best practice.
- The Board should review the lease annually and consider bumping up the payment per the previously agreed upon schedule.
- The Board should evaluate Contract Receivables annually to determine of the Allowance to Uncollectible amounts is necessary.

New Program from the National Grange: The Board received information on a new program called AirMedCare Network. A discussion and review of new program was held. It was determined that we didn't have sufficient information about this program. Master Susan Noah will find out more information about program and report back to the Board.

Donation of money to the Communications Fellows program at National Grange:

Communications Fellows program was discussed and their request of a donation/contribution to the program. It was felt that the recipient of this program should make a presentation at the State Session and that we need to promote this program. Malcolm Trupp made a motion to contribute \$1000.00 to the Communications Fellow Program. Alice Nowicki seconded the motion. The motion was carried.

Decisions made by email:

- Agreement to allow South Fork Grange #605 to withdraw \$6,898.44 from their trust funds for flooring painting and texturing the walls.
- Approval for the Subordinate/Pomona Investment Application and guidelines.
- Agreement to allow Bellview Grange #759 to withdraw \$9,600.00 from their trust funds for stage lighting and encroaching dirt problems around the foundation.
- Agreement to approve the draft audit as presented by Moss Adams.

Grange Reports:

- Goshen Grange# 561: An update and discussion was held regarding their status.
- Sixes Grange #856: A discussion was held regarding the river access.
- Tillamook Pomona # 9: An update was given on their future organization.

 - Schedule There was positive feedback regarding the activities on Saturday and Sunday that made state session easier to participate in without the commitment to the full week. This change also makes securing a venue easier for the hosting district, and lodging easier for attendees. There were suggestions to have more consistency with open/close times, moving the memorial service, moving conferences around, having some guest speakers/conferences during meals rather than a separate time on the floor. For some attendees Sunday felt rushed, we may consider adjusting the schedule to make our official opening day run smoother. We would like to get more feedback from members and see how the 2017 session goes before making any other major changes.

o Members – we were happy with the attendance at this year's session. There were quite a few new faces, including a significant increase in members taking the degrees. We also noticed how pleasant everyone was while discussing and debating issues. The mutual respect we have for each other's varying ideas and opinions is one of our assets in the Grange.

The committee adjourned for lunch from 12:30pm to 1:15pm.

- Eastside Grange \$14,800.00 was received from the sale of Eastside Grange near Lakeview. Due to the asbestos and other problems with the building the hall was taken down and the property was sold to the local fire department.
- Elk City Grange a sales agreement has been drafted with Jim Salisbury and an escrow is being set up.
- Other properties for sale Boring-Damascus Grange member Buzi Nelson is the listing agent for a few properties. Buzi has been visiting the three properties she has listed and is starting to see some interest.
 - o Crowfoot Grange is sad looking inside. At the agent's suggestion we dropped the price to \$99,000.
 - o Fair Oaks is in decent shape. They have nice stations and sashes in the building.
 - o Mud Springs is in decent shape and still has dishes and silverware.
- Chenowith Grange Sarah made a motion to research the previously drawn contract
 with Spee-Dee Haulers and actively pursue the sale/title transfer of Chenowith Grange.
 Jeff seconded. The Executive Committee voted in 2008 to transfer the title of the
 Grange building to Spee-Dee Haulers, the business owner was a Grange member who
 owns the land and was leasing the property to the Grange. Motion carried.
- Oregon State Grange tax return has been completed and submitted. The cost was a little over \$2000.

New Business:

- By-law changes that were made at state session have been typed up and will soon be sent out to Granges.
- The storage unit was cleared out and items were moved upstairs to the new unit on July 10th. Garbage has been cleaned up, and items we are keeping were organized. The old stage went to Boring-Damascus Grange.
- Myrtle Point Sportsman Club is interested in the Myrtle Grange property. The Grange just recently became dormant again after being reorganized in 2012. State Deputy Carol Everman reported that the building is in fairly good shape. Don moved that we continue to give consideration into the future of this Grange. Roger seconded. Susan will respond to the letter from the Myrtle Point Sportsman Club to let them know our first option is always to reorganize a dormant Grange, and if we decide to place the property on the market we will let them know. The motion carried.
- The 2018 State Grange session will be hosted by District 3. A few members from that district are starting to explore venues and coordinate with Granges.
- The office is purchasing two racks for the paper room to store the dormant Grange files
- Out-of-date equipment was taken by The Ink Spot they are working on a proposal for offsetting some of our printing costs. The Executive Committee praised the staff for their work in cleaning up and organizing the office in recent months. It is looking great!
- Holley property we received a request from the purchasers of the Holley property to sign off on a lot line adjustment. Our attorney, Nancy Murray, is looking into how this may affect our contract.

- The OSU Small Farms Conference is in February and our Agriculture Director Jay Sexton is interested in having the Grange as a sponsor. The cost would be \$625 and includes a hosted table to meet & greet attendees. Jeff moved that we authorize the silver sponsorship for the OSU Small Farms Conference from the Leadership/Membership Fund. Celia seconded. The discussion about the event included the value of promoting the Grange with the demographic of attendees. The motion carried.
- Banners Don moved that we purchase 150th anniversary banners for all of the active Subordinate Granges in Oregon. Roger seconded. A few banner designs were reviewed at the previous meeting and further discussed today. Sarah and Susan will continue to work on the banner design with the tag line of "uniting communities since 1867". Motion carried. When a good sale comes up we'll purchase the banners and work on delivering most through the leadership team to save funds on mailing.
- Employee Handbook our auditors are encouraging us to use an employee handbook to ensure consistency in policies with managing employees. An old handbook was located but is very out of date. Jeff made a motion that we work on updating our handbook to implement in 2017. Don seconded. Sarah will review the old handbook and bring back suggestions to the next meeting. Motion carried.

Decisions Made Via Email:

- Agreement to allow Keizer to withdraw \$475 from trust funds for tree work.
- Agreement to loan Lowell an additional \$11,000 to replace a failed heat pump.
 Payments will continue at \$600 quarterly with the current 5% interest charge extending the term.
- Agreement to allow Woodburn to withdraw \$25,000 from trust funds for new siding.
- Agreement to allow Boring-Damascus to withdraw \$25,975.08 from trust funds to replace windows and remaining exterior doors.
- Agreement to allow Little Deschutes to withdraw \$15,000 from trust funds for shed project.
- Agreement to allow Kinton to withdraw \$5,000 from trust funds for operating expenses.
- Agreement to allow Fruitdale to withdraw \$7358 from trust funds for kitchen work and security system.

Grange Reports:

- Azalea Grange Carol Everman gave an update on the status of Azalea Grange after her visit earlier in July. They are struggling with membership and upkeep.
- Fernwood Grange Susan has been communicating with the Master and will be visiting their meeting in August. Active membership has continued to decline, and they are considering closing.
- Goshen Grange an update was provided regarding the Goshen property improvements.
- Keizer Grange We were excited to see several representatives at the state session.
 They are doing well and actively working at keeping the hall viable. There has been discussion about re-districting to combine Polk and Marion Pomonas. Susan will set up a meeting with their members to further discuss.

Deputy & State Officer Reports:

- Susan will be traveling for Grange this fall October to the Maine State Grange as the national officer representative, and November to Washington D.C. for the National Grange Convention.
- Rickreall Grange Carol provided an update regarding Rickreall's property.

 Pleasant Valley Grange – Carol gave an update on the membership focus for Pleasant Valley. They are working hard and are receptive to assistance from the State Grange leadership, which we are happy with.

Minutes of Executive Committee Meeting - October 30, 2016

The meeting was called to order at 8am by Master, Susan Noah.

In attendance was Master Susan Noah, Secretary Sarah Kingsborough, Exec Committee 1 Jeff Dehne, Exec Committee 2 Don Sether, Exec Committee 3 Roger Wilson. Overseer Celia Luttrell was absent. State Deputy Carol Everman joined the meeting at 8:45am.

Prior Meeting Minutes:

 Minutes from the previous Executive Committee Meeting on July 31st, 2016 were read and approved with minor corrections.

Financial Reports:

- Accounting Review We reviewed copies of the current financial statements to the committee.
 - o The Mandell Hall Improvement fund was added to the balance sheet with the \$30,000 allocated for the Grange sign project. Only two Granges have requested funds for their signs thus far. The deadline is May 31, 2017. We will encourage more Granges to participate, possibly with a Bulletin article.
- Investment Review Scott Barker from Barker Wealth Advisors. Scott has been working
 within the Oregon State Grange's investment policy to manage our investments in
 recent years.
 - o We've had a 6.1% growth in our portfolio YTD. Our portfolio is approximately half stocks and half bonds. The cash accessible is sufficient to manage our anticipated needs in the next year, and we can contact Scott if anything changes. There will of course be some volatility based on the election and regular cycles.
- State office reports Jan Oleson submitted a written report including membership totals, delinquent reports/dues, and loans to Granges.
 - o We had a net increase of 35 members in the 3rd quarter. Woohoo!
 - o Granges with delinquent dues and loans were reviewed and discussed.
 - Surveys were sent to all Granges regarding music licenses. If Granges play any kind of music for events (unless it is in the public domain), a license is required. The National Grange is working on getting a license that covers all Granges.
 - o A list of life members was reviewed and discussed. There are currently 976 life members. Some Granges have dropped life members, which should only occur upon the member's request. Some life members were from Granges which are now dormant. Additional accounting and organization will continue with the life membership to ensure it is managed appropriately. Don moved and Jeff seconded

that the OSG office require a written request from the life member when the quarterly report indicates they have requested to be dropped. Motion passed. A letter will be sent to the dropped member and the Secretary of the Grange after the OSG office receives the quarterly report.

o The Visa & MasterCard bills were reviewed per audit procedures.

Unfinished Business:

- Western Regional
 - o There was positive feedback and good attendance from other states. Joe Stefenoni's workshop on membership was very well received. People liked that we include workshops and information for more than just the youth in our region, it truly is a leadership conference.
 - o The final expense for the OSG was \$2390.86
- Elk City Grange escrow account opened to start the sales contract with Jim Salisbury. We received \$20,000 on August 15, 2016. The Grange sign has still not been removed as it is behind a pile of blackberries and not easily accessible.
- By-Law changes were mailed out in early September.
- Proceedings from State Grange Convention were mailed in late August
- Restraint of Title Work Still need to cover the following counties: Baker, Clackamas, Crook, Jackson, Jefferson, Curry, Lake, Malheur, Josephine, Marion, Tillamook, Washington, Wheeler. Others have been filed and are on record. The OSG office will provide the documentation to the Executive Committee, and we will get the remaining deeds recorded.
- Willakenzie Grange electrical upgrade work has started. This was authorized by the Executive Committee last spring.

New Business:

- 2018 Convention Hosting in District 3. They met on October 29th and made a few decisions. The convention will be at the Clatsop County Fairgrounds. Marilyn Reiher and Eva Frost will be the co-chairs of the planning committee. The next meeting will be the 3rd Sunday of February.
- The Ink Spot took our old equipment, and they gave us a \$2000 credit against future work.
- Holley Property Received a request from the purchasers, and the lot line adjustment was done. A piece of the property was sold.
- Banners The directors reviewed the banners at their retreat. They prefer the patriotic background. Susan will order the next time she sees a 40-50% deal. Don moved and Roger seconded that we order banners without grommets. Motion passed.
- Employee Handbook Discussed changes for the employee handbook for 2017. We will have four non-exempt employees next year. Sarah will send a copy of the employee handbook to everyone for final approval and distribution to employees by the end of the year. Vacation will be based on the calendar year.
 - All employees will receive three paid sick days/24 hours annually to be used for medical injury or illness. Employees can accrue up to 12 paid sick days/96 hours. Accrued sick time is not paid out upon termination.
 - o 0-2 years employed receive one week/three days paid vacation
 - o 3-5 years employed receive two weeks/six days paid vacation
 - o 6+ years employed receive three weeks/nine days paid vacation
 - o Two weeks of vacation time can roll over into the first quarter of the next year. Vacation time is not paid out upon termination.

- Holidays paid will include: New Year's Day, Christmas, and Thanksgiving every year.

 Memorial Day, Independence Day, and Labor Day will be paid if they fall on a regularly scheduled day.
 - Don moved and Jeff seconded that we pay for Christmas & New Year's Day always and other holidays only if they fall on a work day. Don moved to amend the motion to include Thanksgiving with the always paid for category of Christmas and New Year's Day. Motion passed.
- Mud Springs Grange Offer of \$100,000, which is lower than the \$160,000. Don moved and Sarah seconded to allow the \$100,000 sales price, but not accept the offer under the current terms for the OSG to carry the loan; the borrower needs to provide their own financing.
- National Grange Loan Amortization schedule has been updated due to a request to
 extend the interest only term of the loan an additional year. The payments are currently
 set for interest only until the 1st quarter of 2017. Don moved and Roger seconded that
 we offer an additional extension to the National Grange for one more year of interest
 only payments. Motion passed.
- North Howell Grange and Gold Hill Grange have both been dormant for some time, and there doesn't appear to be interest in reorganizing there. Sarah made a motion and Roger seconded that we sell both Grange properties. Motion passed. Buzi Nelson will put these on the market.
- Holiday Schedule Don moved to close the office, with pay, on the Thursday before Christmas and the Thursday before New Year's Day. Susan has vacation scheduled for January 7th-17th.
- Center for Non-Profit Stewardship Conference on Nov. 5th. Susan, Mark and Marilyn are attending and will be able to attend most of the workshops offered.
- Lobbyist The budget for 2017 was reduced for the lobbyist. We need a plan for communications, help, and support to maintain the Grange's good relationship with the state legislature. There will be a short column in the Bulletin to announce that we are looking for volunteers to support the Legislative committee and our lobbying efforts.
- Matching Grant Awards We reviewed the committee recommendations for the 26 Grant applications received for the 2016-2017 year. Don moved and Roger seconded to approve 13 Granges to receive a total of \$49894.50. Motion passed.

Executive Committee Meeting Minutes January 21, 2017

The meeting was called to order by State Master Susan Noah at 9:10am. All present except for Secretary Sarah Kingsborough, who was missing due to illness. Mark Noah took minutes for the meeting.

Prior meeting minutes

October 30, 2016—approved as read

It was noted that we received thank-you cards from Riley Reynolds for supporting his trip to National Grange; from Rock Wall Grange and Multnomah Grange for approving their grant applications; from Jessie Jo Guttridge for supporting her applications to be National Grange Youth Officer and John Trimble Experience applicant.

Financial Reports

- > Celia Current Reports (further review and discussion after lunch, see below)
 - o Timeline for Audit
 - Worthy Master reports they are working on posting to December, should be done by end of this month (Jan). Auditors can expect to start in March. A different staff member from the auditing firm will be in charge this time.
 - Worthy Master has had more requests for info from trust fund Granges, which adds to year-end accounting activity. Also, uncashed checks are becoming a larger problem for the OSG accounting division, especially Pomona Grange dues checks.
- Scott Barker Barker Wealth Advisors Current Investment reports
 - Scott was here at 10am as scheduled and provided quarterly report information as of 12/31/16, with Schwab analysis of expected financial picture for the coming year.
 - OSG YTD portfolio return is 6.4%, based on our relatively conservative investment approach. We also earned approximately 3% dividend income in addition to the portfolio growth. Scott led the committee through a detailed examination of our investment portfolio.
 - Worthy Master will schedule time for a presentation by Scott at the 2017
 State Grange session in Florence.
- Jan's reports
 - o Grange Loan update (receivables)
 - Coburg West Point plans to pay off their loan in the next quarter. Other Granges who are late with loan payments will receive notices.
 - Granges who are late with their dues payments were reviewed—several are behind by more than one quarter.
 - Contracts on sold properties were reviewed; all are current.
 - National Grange will begin paying principal and interest on revised amortization schedule (term was extended by one year).

- Analysis of utility expenses shows some increases to City and for garbage and security services, but slight declines in energy expense for both PGE and NW Natural.
- Per resolution at 2016 OSG session, insurance status for each Subordinate Grange has been collected and was analyzed. We have insurance company name, policy number and expiration date for all Granges. There are only 28 Granges who either have no insurance or did not send in the information required by the resolution.
- o EC to look over Visa & Master Card bills
 - Don Sether reviewed the Worthy Master's credit card expense bills and found no problems.
- o Membership analysis
 - Shows loss of 41 members from Q3 to Q4; also loss of one Grange over that period. There have been several consolidations in year 2016 but also several who became dormant.
 - List of Granges with 17 or fewer members seems to be getting longer, and there are several under the legal limit of 13 and in danger of being closed. It is hoped that the new Membership Campaign will help these Granges especially, so that they can remain in Active status.
 - Junior program showing gains
 - Family membership has dropped, most likely due to children 'aging out' of their plan.

Unfinished Business

- ➤ Restraint of Title work still need to cover the following counties: Baker, Clackamas, Crook, Jackson, Jefferson, Curry, Lake, Malheur, Josephine, Marion, Tillamook, Washington, Wheeler. The Worthy Master believes that one or two needed may need to be retyped, not sure of the problems with the other. All others have been filed and are on record.
 - Worthy Master will work with attorney to develop talking points for Grangers to take to County Clerks and file appropriate documentation for these remaining counties.
- ➤ Work was finished on the Willakenzie hall and check has been cut for payment. The final bill was \$13.506.46.
- > Employee Handbook and Employee Evaluations
 - Sarah was unable to attend this meeting but reported that a computer failure destroyed any progress she had made on this project. Worthy Master will make sure we have something in place in time for our audit in April.
- National Grange selected the amortization that will extend the loan for one more year (see Jan's Loan Updates section above)
- ➤ GrangeUp '17 is being rolled out tomorrow (January 22) at Irving. All the State Officers, Directors and District Chairs have been requested to be there to select their Granges to visit.
 - Worthy Master has emailed and notified directors and OSG officers. Weather issues will impact attendance to some degree, unfortunately.
 - o Also at this meeting OSG officers will decide on a practice schedule.
- ➤ With the new budget year we are only paying for one State Deputy, Carol Everman. Derrell has agreed to help out for expense money as has Malcolm Trupp; both will be recognized as Special State Deputies.

New Business

- North Howell Grange is in escrow.
 - Hall has not been cleaned out, but the sale might close by end of this month.
 There are a few good chairs still at the hall, and there may also be other paraphernalia or regalia, possibly also dishes and etc. Worthy Master and Brother Don will check out the situation this week.
- Never received an answer on the listing of Franklin what do we want to do? Ed St. Claire has had it for nearly 5 years; apparently the building is really deteriorating.
 - Listing expired in November '16; what is next step? Motion by Don to ask Buzi Nelson to look at the Franklin property and give us her opinion. Seconded by Roger. Additional discussion...the motion carried.
- ➤ Deer Creek Grange Wants to partner with the Illinois Valley Fire Department to relocate their current Station #5 to the Deer Creek Grange Property. Nancy would have to draw up a lease. Members of Deer Creek were planning on being here at 11:00 am but were unable to attend due to the weather.
 - The committee reviewed documents provided; some questions were raised about the well and septic and access. The EC moved to the Worthy Master's office and a conference call was made to Deer Creek. Their members participating in the conference call are Bill Waggoner, Master; Delaine Sherman, Sec; David Anderson, Overseer; Chris Sherman, Steward of Deer Creek and representing the Fire Dept: Linda Silva, LAS; and Darlene Anderson, Treasurer. Original Fire Dept proposal included a suggestion of \$1000 per year payment from the fire dept; the Deer Creek group suggests that be \$1200 or \$100 per month, and there was no objection from Chris as the FD representative. Question about parking; it needs to be established that the fire dept has sufficient space. Chis represents the FD and says they have been granted access to the property by the county, so they will not be using the Grange driveway or parking at all. Chris says FD will improve the well house and electric service to it and to the Grange, and upgrade the existing septic system to handle their use. He also says they would return the Grange to pre-existing state if the FD has to withdraw from the project. They are envisioning annual payments on Jan 31 of each year. WM states that OSG will have our attorney submit a lease document based on existing examples, for them to review and approve. WM asks about timeline; Chris says they would like to act ASAP, hoping to start construction as soon as weather permits. Worthy Master will talk to attorney and try to have initial paperwork for Deer Creek members to review, ASAP. FD intends to make a full year payment for 2017 when this agreement is approved. Jeff asks, if the Grange fails, what would FD expect? They would continue payment to OSG for duration of dormancy, then expect right of first refusal after that dormancy period. Worthy Master will call attorney Nancy Murray ASAP to get this rolling but it will probably take a month or more Chris seems OK with this, as does the rest of the Deer Creek Grange group. After the conference call, Jeff moved to allow Illinois Valley RFD to lease a portion of the Deer Creek property as described in the IFRFD proposal. Don seconded the motion. The motion was approved. The Worthy Master will contact attorney Nancy Murray regarding the lease paperwork. Questions to resolve, are they digging a new septic or running their line to the existing septic? Also, will the electric improvements include a separate drop-line and meter for the FD?
- ➤ Matching Grant information One Grange has recommended that the State Grange consider a follow up grant that targets membership development to those who have successfully completed the original Matching Grant.

- o There was discussion about this idea, possible funding strategies, etc.
- ➤ Loan of \$4,383 was made to Goshen. They would like to pay \$100/month as a minimum, and if they can do more they will.
 - o Don moved to accept the proposed terms, \$100/month payments at 5% interest. Seconded by Jeff. Some additional discussion. The motion carried.
- ➤ We need to discuss and develop a "Collections and Preservations Policy" for the Oregon State Grange, and find a volunteer to continue on with the scanning started by Ed Luttrell.
 - o The committee reviewed the State Grange of Minnesota Collections Policy. The Worthy Master suggests this should remain an agenda item for future EC meetings. There was discussion about what should be saved, where and how to save or store things, & whether there might be grant money available for such preservation projects. Grange materials in private possession ought to be properly labeled so non-members who encounter them will know what to do with them. Records ought to be digitized and stored in searchable format. We should have a policy for the distribution or dispersal of various items that are routinely encountered when a Grange goes dormant.

Lunch Break

- ➤ We returned to Financial
 - Celia discussed balance sheets, current reports and individual fund accounts.
- ➤ National wants their payments based on National Data base. We will need extra help to get it completely caught up. Either volunteer or part time help.
 - National Grange is asking for more data than we have collected in the past.
 Discussed ways of getting help and the cost. Don moved, Roger seconded, to authorize up to \$1500 for short-term paid help to get this data entered. Discussion followed. The motion was adopted.
- ➤ Regarding the Moss Adams recommendation to add off site storage for data backup, we have taken a first step and have purchased another disc drive. As soon as we make sure that the backup includes all pertinent programs and documents, we will purchase a second and swap once a week.
 - No committee action required at this time.
- ➤ Lobbyist Received a letter from Deschutes Pomona urging us to appoint or hire a lobbyist for the Oregon State Grange as the earliest possible date.
 - o Executive Committee discussed varying strategies to accomplish this...there is no budget to hire a lobbyist, even if we had the funds, we would not likely get much representation for what we used to pay. Best idea might be to find a volunteer or volunteers who will monitor the session activities and provide updates via the Legislative Director and local committees. Our former lobbyist Jim Welsh offered to meet with Leg Dir Mark Noah to discuss these issues and provide some input. Former lobbyist Ed Luttrell also offered support and advice. Perhaps our various District Chairs could monitor, suggest issues and information that ought to be distributed, and initiate this through the OSG Leg Director or State Master.
- > State Master's conference coming up in February. Worthy Master will be attending, also possibly the first gentleman. This one is in Connecticut, and most of the Western States want this to come to the West Coast.
 - o No action required by Executive Committee at this time.
- Contract for Clatsop County Fairgrounds for 2018 State Session was presented for review.

- This location is the choice of the District committee for 2018. It will be similar to Benton County Fairgrounds regarding amenities. Jeff moved that the District 3 2018 steering committee recommendation of Clatsop County Fairgrounds location for the 2018 session be approved. Seconded by Roger, and the motion carried.
- Policy for virtual attendance at meetings.
 - o National Grange formally decided that State Granges should make their own policies regarding virtual attendance. There was extensive discussion and the consensus is that we need to develop such a policy ASAP. Don moved that we table this issue until our April meeting. Roger seconded the motion. The motion carried.
- Request from Warren Grange for trust funds.
 - Requesting \$2400; Don moved to accept the request, Jeff seconded, and the motion carried.

Decisions made via email

- Agreement to allow Springwater to withdraw \$4,200 from their trust funds for various projects and expenses.
- Agreement to counter the \$50,000 Crowfoot offer with one of \$60,000.
- Agreement to allow Fruitdale Grange to withdraw \$1,150 from their trust funds for work on their water system
- Agreement to loan Goshen up to \$4,983 to pay Nancy Murray's bill. Bill turned out to be only \$4,383.00
- ➤ Agreement to sell North Howell for the listing price of \$210,000.
- ➤ Agreement to allow Keizer to withdraw \$862.45 from their trust fund for work on their shed and some clean up around the building.
- Agreement to counter the \$20,000 Crowfoot offer with one of \$80,000 (prior to the \$50,000 offer) counter was not accepted.
- ➤ Agreement to allow Sandlake Grange to withdraw \$5,617 from their trust funds for a heat pump and some building repairs in the form of exterior wall replacement and roof maintenance.
- Agreement to allow Keizer to withdraw funds from their trust fund in the amount of \$50.25 to pay for changing the locks on the building.
 - o Motion by Jeff to affirm these decisions and include them in the minutes of this meeting. Seconded by Roger, and the motion carried.

Grange Reports

- o **Chenowith -** The Worthy Master has the signed agreement back and just needs to get it notarized and sent in and that property should be off our hands.
- o **Crowfoot –** The last offer we countered went away, but Buzi thinks we may be getting another one.
- o Fair Oaks Nothing is happening.
- o Franklin Discussed previously during this meeting
- o Gold Hill Buzi seems to think that we may be getting an offer on this soon.
- o **Goshen -** Discussed previously during this meeting. Also, some discussion regarding their problem evicting their renter/caretaker. They have only been there a couple months so eviction should not be complicated.
- o **Keizer -** They have not paid dues for three quarters and have been sent a letter
- o **Lookout Mountain/Terrebonne** The former Lookout Mountain hall has been sold for \$50,000, netting \$45,595.50. The State Grange was sent a check for \$44,595.50, leaving the other \$1,000 for Terrebonne. They were informed by the

- State Master to close out their bank account and to send all of it on to Terrebonne including the \$1,000 from the sale of property.
- o **Milwaukie & Hillsboro** Both Milwaukie and Hillsboro have paid up but the Worthy Master has not been able to schedule a meeting with either one. One was scheduled with Hillsboro but the weather got in the way, and it was cancelled, to be rescheduled before the end of January.
- o **Mud Springs** –Buzi plans on contacting the people who were interested last year to see if they still have any interest. She reported just today that there was a break-in last night (1/21/17) involving some broken windows. The perpetrator was caught in the act. She'll coordinate with local people to make sure broken windows are boarded up.
- North Howell Discussed previously at this meeting.
- o **Salmon River -** State Deputy Carol Everman reported they may be resolving their issues with members living on the property in RVs. They still have some issues regarding articles for sale accumulating in or around the building. They are working on resolving parking issues and marking the 'no parking' areas.
- o **Rickreall** Carol continues reporting; there is a continuation of the issue with the neighbor regarding easement for access. There was an offer of an agreement but weather caused cancellation of the Grange meeting.
- o **Gresham -** Carol continues reporting; says they have been holding meetings but cancelled December and January due to weather. Because of the weather cancellations they are holding officer installation this month and Carol will be installing them. Their flea market tables compete with the Grange hall for available space.
- o **Jackson Pomona** Not having meetings; say they cannot get enough people. Hearing similar reports from several other Pomona Granges around the state.
- o Valley Falls Buzi has not had time to get down there to look over this property. Regarding possible reorganization, the Worthy Master spoke with one potential mentor but due to travel and weather problems this member could not commit to regular contact with a new Grange at Valley Falls. Without constant nurturing, prospects of success are low for a reorganized Grange where there is no existing Grange infrastructure and potential networking support.

Executive Committee Meeting Minutes April 1, 2017

Prior meeting minutes from January 21st were read and approved as corrected. Thank you to Mark Noah who filled in as the pro-tem Secretary since Sarah Kingsborough was absent.

Financial Reports

- Celia Current Reports
- ➤ We received 2017 funds from GIA new allocation \$4,475.00 per quarter \$17,900 per year. This is a reduced amount from previous years. The funds that come from GIA go

- into the Leadership/Membership Fund that helps cover Grange programs, committees, and leadership training activities.
- ➤ National Grange in 2017 is hosted by the Western Region. Some expenses will be covered by the National Grange Convention fund. We will also have responsibility as one of the host states. More to come as the year progresses.
- ➤ Jan's reports We reviewed the membership reports and discussed a few Granges that have low membership. Our officers and deputies have visited most of these. We hope our GrangeUp '17 Campaign this year will help all of our Granges grow and thrive again. A handful of Granges are late with Quarterly Reports, dues, and fees.
 - o Loan update Granges with outstanding loans to the OSG were reviewed.
 - o EC to look over Visa & Master Card bills for audit purposes.
- ➤ Scott Barker Barker Wealth Advisors Scott provided us with the investment reports through March 30th, 2017. Our rate of return thus far this year is 2.94%. We are on track with the OSG investment policy. Scott reviewed recent market trends, which show growth and low volatility despite recent press/politics. The market is high, which gives some people concern. It's best to manage through uncertainty with conservative and diverse investments.
 - Scott will be attending our 2017 Oregon State Grange Convention to address the delegate body. Susan will coordinate with Scott on the schedule for Monday/ Tuesday.

Unfinished Business

- Restraint of Title work still need to cover the following counties: Baker, Clackamas, Crook, Jackson, Jefferson, Curry, Lake, Malheur, Josephine, Marion, Tillamook, Washington, Wheeler. All others have been filed and are on record.
 - o Don made a motion that the office will continue work on this, and we will revisit at our July Executive Committee Meeting. If there are counties/properties that are more complicated, then we may refer the remaining properties to the attorney to complete. Motion was seconded by Celia and carried.
- > Employee Handbook and Employee Evaluations are still on the "to do" list for 2017.
- ➤ Deer Creek Grange We reviewed a first draft of the ground lease for the property at Deer Creek Grange with the Illinois Valley Volunteer Firefighter's Association. Deer Creek and The Firefighter's Association will have the opportunity to review and edit this draft before a final one is complete.
- ➤ GrangeUp '17 We're excited to report that the promotional boxes and banners have been presented to 148/169 of our Granges across Oregon. 11 are slated to go in April; the other 10 are pending communication with the volunteers. Overall feedback from Granges has been very positive. The budget was reviewed.
 - o Sarah moved to increase the budget by \$5000 to cover the cost of travel that has come in a little higher than expected, and the new member gifts in anticipation of more than the budgeted 340 new members. Celia seconded, the motion carried.
- ➤ Virtual attendance at meetings OSG and the National Grange passed resolutions in 2016 to allow for virtual attendance at Subordinate meetings. Susan will create a draft of policy for virtual attendance at Subordinate meetings. We will review at our next meeting and present the changes at the OSG State Convention this June.

The executive committee adjourned for lunch from 12:40pm to 1:15pm.

Financial reports for the end of 2016. The balance sheet, dormant funds, trust funds, and other accounts were reviewed and discussed.

New Business

- ➤ Lobbyist The OSG does not currently have a contracted lobbyist. There will be a resolution at the 2017 OSG Convention to hire a lobbyist using funds from another fund. We have a desire for our organization to continue being represented in the legislature, and to provide regular communications of legislative action/activities. Some of the OSG policies are out dated. Susan will again encourage the Legislative committee to draft resolutions for this year's convention that will make our policy more current.
 - Don moved to offer \$2000 on a contract level to have a lobbyist/representative for the remaining 2017 Oregon State Legislative session. Jeff seconded and the motion carried.
- > Keizer Grange has closed and been declared dormant.
- Request from Riversdale to sell the Evergreen property for \$150,000.
 - Jeff moved that Evergreen Grange be authorized to proceed with the sale at \$150,000. Sarah seconded and the motion carried.
- Request from Netel Grange for funds not to exceed \$17,500 for a new septic system, which is a high-end estimate.
 - o Jeff moved to extend a loan to Netel Grange for the amount of the invoice to be repaid in a 100 month term at 5%. Don Seconded. Sarah made a motion to amend to offer a maximum term of 10 years/120 payments. Discussion followed regarding the request and affordable loan terms. The amendment carried. The motion, as amended, carried.
- ➤ The OSG building in Salem is in need of a new draft inducer for the heating/cooling unit.
 total cost \$507.00
 - Jeff moved to replace the draft inducer and the fan in the men's room. Don seconded. Motion carried.
- ➤ Ivy is starting to crawl over the roof of our building, and needs to be removed before it does damage to roof or heating/cooling system. Don volunteered to work on the ivy.
- Mohawk-McKenzie has been meeting at the Willakenzie Hall for several years. The OSG office will draft a hall use agreement as Willakenzie is currently under the Dormant Grange restriction.
- ➤ Library presentations on the 150th Anniversary. Marilyn Reiher and Jay Sexton have put together a 150th anniversary display for placement in libraries throughout the state of Oregon. Several libraries have already committed to displaying Grange information this year.
 - o Roger moved to allocate \$1500 for the 150th Anniversary library promotion. Don seconded. Jeff moved to add travel expenses in the form of mileage reimbursement, on top of the \$1500. Roger seconded. The motion, as amended, was carried.
- > Gold Hill The property is for sale and has a few repair needs, including the furnace.
 - o Jeff moved to pay the bill for the Gold Hill furnace and take the remainder under consideration as it comes up. Don seconded and the motion carried.
- ➤ The National Grange shared communications regarding grants by the USDA that Granges might be eligible for. Jeff volunteered to research this and report back.
- Oregon Agricultural Heritage Program Legislative Hearing April 4th with several other agriculture organizations.
- Growing Oregon magazine in 2016 we had an ad in the magazine.
 - Don moved to authorize an ad for the 2017 magazine. Jeff seconded and the motion carried.
- ➤ State Grange Officer dresses will be used for OSG Convention and the 2017 National Grange 6th degree team.

 Don moved to allocate \$100 for each dress; the remainder of the dress cost is up to each state officer. The funds come from the National Grange fund since they will be used for this year's National Grange Convention. Roger seconded, motion carried.

- ➤ Agreement to counter the Franklin offer at \$95,000.

- > Keizer has been declared closed.

- Roxy Ann the community has expressed interest in reorganizing the Grange.
- Stanfield/Columbia are considering a merger.


