AG #1: Maintenance of Exclusive Farm Use Zones

1 Whereas: Oregon agriculture is an important part of the state economy and deserves
2 protection by supporting rural and urban communities, contributing 686,518 jobs,
3 \$29.71 billion in wages, and \$2.85 billion in exports to Oregon's economy; and
4 Whereas: Exclusive Farm Use (EFU) lands are working lands, and need to be zoned and
5 managed to protect local agriculture and the statewide economy; and
6 Whereas: Allowed non-farm uses that have been approved as exceptions within the EFU
7 zone have grown from just a few when land-use planning was established to
8 more than 60 currently; and
9 Whereas: Each additional non-farm use creates additional conflicts with commercial
10 agriculture, such as heavier traffic, dust complaints, noise complaints, land value
11 inflation, trespassing, and trash, etc. Therefore be it
12 Resolved: That the Oregon State Grange supports the maintenance of the Exclusive Farm
13 Use zone for farms and opposes allowing additional non-farm uses in the EFU
14 zone.

 13 would be possible if we have policy that supports broad policy concepts and
 14 would be applicable to many specific legislative issues; and

15 Whereas: Effective Grange advocacy in supporting both small farms and direct-from-farm-
 16 to-consumers will promote Grange with people desiring more reliance on local
 17 healthy fresh food; and

AG #3: State Meat Inspection Program

Committee: Agriculture

() Local (x) State () National

1 Whereas: The number of USDA Federal Meat Inspection locations has been reduced to 13
2 statewide, forcing producers to transport animals long distances for slaughter
3 and inspection; and

4 Whereas: Currently only USDA inspected meat may be legally sold to restaurants and retail
5 outlets; and

6 Whereas: Oregon had a state meat inspection program that ended in the 1970s; and

7 Whereas: Increased access to Oregon meat inspection facilities will encourage local
8 producers to be able to market meat in their local area with less transport costs.

9 Therefore be it

10 Resolved: That the Oregon State Grange strongly supports the re-establishment of a State
11 Meat Inspection Program, with health and safety requirements that insure safe
12 products to consumers and safe work conditions for slaughterhouse workers.

AG #4: Small Farmer Income Definition

Committee: Agriculture

Local State National

1 Whereas: Small farm operations have dwindled over the last 50 years; and
2 Whereas: In 1950 there were 20 million farmers, in 2019 the statistics show 2,023,400 farmers,
3 and since 2018 another 5,800 farms have ceased operations; and
4 Whereas: Small farmers fail when bureaucracy and regulations are burdensome. One
5 reason farmers are giving up is because they are spending an inordinate amount
6 of time filling out required paperwork, leaving less time to actively farm, or they
7 spend time farming and don't get paperwork completed; and
8 Whereas: Corporate farming has increased the requirements for paperwork to be filled out,
9 while small farmers don't have the financial means to hire additional employees
10 to complete required paperwork; and
11 Whereas: The USDA considers a small farm \$350,000 or less income per year; a more
12 realistic annual income of a small farmer is \$150,000 gross a year. Therefore be it
13 Resolved: That the National Grange actively lobby federal officials and state officials to
14 create a regulatory category for small farms with less than \$150,000 gross income
15 per year, with such category having reduced regulation and cost burdens.

1 Whereas: Oregon Senators Ron Wyden and Jeff Merkley have co-sponsored the 21st
2 Century Conservation Corps Act (S. 487); and
3 Whereas: The act would develop and finance Qualified Youth or Conservation Corps; and
4 Whereas: The Secretary of the Department of Agriculture, the Interior, Homeland Security,
5 Commerce, or Labor, a state or local resource management agency, or another
6 entity responsible for community development or climate adaption would
7 establish and carry out a 21st Century Conservation Corps program. The
8 program would be carried out using qualified youth or conservation corps
9 criteria and through Civilian Conservation Corps projects; and
10 Whereas: Grants will be made to eligible qualified youth or conservation corps, acting in
11 partnership with project partners, to carry out Civilian Conservation Corps
12 projects, in which the grant funds are used to administer comprehensive youth
13 and workforce development programs; and
14 Whereas: The National Grange, in discussion with June Colony, Oregon State Grange
15 Agricultural Committee Co-Director, has requested Wyden and Merkley to add
16 an amendment to the Act to specifically mention a Farm Corps program for
17 apprenticeships and mentoring of new and beginning farmers. Therefore be it

FAI #1: No Speculation in Water Rights
Committee: Financial Affairs & Insurance
 Local State National

1 Whereas: An average person can only survive without water for approximately three days;
2 and
3 Whereas: Access to water is vital to agriculture and rural communities; and
4 Whereas: Commodifying water by creating a 'free market' for water rights will drive the
5 price of water beyond the reach of many people, benefitting only the private
6 investors and traders who speculate in the value and reap profit from every
7 transaction; and
8 Whereas: The creation of a 'water marketplace' opens the door to the same speculative
9 and at times quasi-legal trading in 'futures,' 'options,' 'derivatives' and the like
10 that has caused boom-and-bust cycles in electrical energy and other
11 commodity markets, generating billions in profit to Wall Street at the expense of
12 the people; and
13 Whereas: For an example of commodifying one of life's necessities, Texas, which has a
14 largely unregulated open market for electricity, recently suffered severe freezing
15 weather and storm activity, creating huge demand for electricity to heat homes
16 and pump water, which resulted in dramatic increases in electricity rates from a
17 typical seasonal average of \$50 per megawatt hour to \$9,000 per megawatt
18 hour, robbing customers of their life savings and pushing some to bankruptcy,
